Of course, in a tribunal such as ours where we all care passionately about the patients and their families, it is very tempting to want, as it were, to see how things progress or monitor events. But we mustn't take over the role of clinician or social worker; we simply have to look at the true facts as they appear on the day, and answer (with reasons) the statutory questions.

I would like to pay tribute to all those involved in our work, and say how much I appreciate your interest and support. I have learned so much from legal representatives, doctors on the wards, nurses, social workers, Mental Health Act Administrators, the Administrative Justice and Tribunals Council, the Royal College of Psychiatrists and, of course our own judges and members — to name but a few of those I have had the pleasure of meeting over the past three months
